A Newborn Church "II Mary stood outside near the tomb, crying. As she cried, she bent down to look into the tomb. 12 She saw two angels dressed in white, seated where the body of Jesus had been, one at the head and one at the foot. ¹³ The angels asked her, "Woman, why are you crying?" She replied, "They have taken away my Lord, and I don't know where they've put him." ¹⁴ As soon as she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she didn't know it was Jesus.

15 Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you crying? Who are you looking for?"

Thinking he was the gardener, she replied, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him and I will get him."

16 Jesus said to her, "Mary."

She turned and said to him in Aramaic, "Rabbouni" (which means Teacher)." John 20:11-16 (CEB)

Mary saw the risen Lord and believed. In that moment when he called her name, she knew he had risen from the dead. I wonder if all his teachings and declarations about his death and resurrection returned with clarity. The wonder of life after death was made real in the calling of her name and the sound of his voice. Her belief led her to the proclamation and witness of a risen Lord. Jesus told her to go and tell the disciples what she had seen, and she did, telling them that she had seen the Lord.

The Church began at that moment. Mary lived the mission of proclamation of the good news of Jesus Christ who was dead and now had risen. All Christian churches stand on the belief of Jesus' death and resurrection. Denominations may differ on what their doctrine says about living out that belief. The core though is the same. Jesus died and Jesus rose from the dead.

The biblical book. Acts of the Apostles records the formation of the early church. Luke records the day of Pentecost when the Holy Spirit was enlivened in the disciples, and they witnessed to all of Jerusalem. Acts continues with the dispersing of disciples to different regions to proclaim the death and resurrection of Jesus and we read of the many conversions and baptisms of individuals and households. The number of believers grew and grew. The conversion of Saul to Paul is the most dramatic conversion recorded in Acts. Saul was a persecutor of Christians until he was met by the Lord who changed his name to Paul upon his conversion. We read of his travels to all parts of the world and all that he suffered for proclaiming Jesus rose from the dead.

Acts will be the primary scripture for sermons beginning Easter Sunday and continuing through Pentecost Sunday (May 19). We will explore the early or first church, looking at their formation and proclamation of Jesus' resurrection. The sermon series theme is "Can Our First Church Be More Like THE First Church." Of course, this is a play on our name, "First United Methodist Church" and The First Church after Jesus' death and resurrection. These seven weeks will offer us an opportunity for revival in our hearts, our worship, our witness, and our First Church.

Kate Bowler, in her book *Have a Beautiful, Terrible Day* writes a reflection of a newborn church. May her reflection be our prayer this Easter Season as we ask, "Can our first church be more like THE first church?"

Let us pray:

"This is what our newborn church looks like: Blessed.

Blessed in our fear and inadequacy.

Blessed by your faith in us.

Blessed that we received by your own hand, the gift of hope – the beginning of the end of sin and of death.

We follow you as best we can along that downward path with all the humility we can manage.

You came back to us.

Alleluia.



Lou's Lines



I recently had the privilege of discussing and demonstrating the benefits of music in early childhood education with our Monday Morning Out Parents. We kept the steady beat with balls and scarves, tapped the beat on our bodies as we read poems with a steady beat, used silly vocal inflection when imitating animal sounds in books, and generally enjoyed making fools of ourselves. Why? Because music is vital to young children! And being a little silly is exactly what it takes to engage and teach at a young age. These are techniques that I use with all ages of 'children' as we explore the joys of music together.

Here are just a few scientific reasons children should participate in music.

Music is one of the few activities that "lights up" both hemispheres of your brain. It is a complex task that promotes physical changes in a child's brain to promote strong thinking capabilities and improve multi-step problem-solving.

An emphasis on rhythm helps improve concentration and focus. In young children, it has shown improvement in impulse control.

Pattern recognition improves with music study, as does memory recall. Both of these skills are necessary building blocks for further learning.

Movement with music builds coordination skills. The more you cross the midline while moving or dancing to the beat, the more 'connections' your brain makes to improve motor coordination.

These are all important in a child's development. But now let's talk about how important it is to have children participate in Church Music:

Reading and singing (or playing) from a printed page gives children a sense of mastery. What better words or melodies to learn than faith-based biblical truths and traditions?

Being part of an accepting, creative community develops self-esteem and confidence.

Singing or playing in a choir reinforces the value of authority. You must adhere to the notes on the page, the composer's suggestions, and the cues of the director to be successful. The cooperation of each individual in this regard allows for group success.

Participating in music helps give value to children as they learn their importance as a worship participant and leader.

Train children in the right way, and when old, they will not stray. Proverbs 22:6
